## **Christmas Update**

This December will bring a close to a very tough 2025. I don't think anyone expected GM to invest a ton of money into a new roof, retool parts of welding and assembly and then shut down production altogether and invoke mass layoffs. There is not a plant in North America that has been through the downtime that our membership has had to endure since 2020 when Covid first came.

We also said good-bye to too many active and retired members who passed away in 2025 – the toughest part of becoming friends is having to say good-bye for the final time.

There are some very important items that need to be mentioned:

- Vacation owed was paid out last week. We have found some errors with the payments, and we are sorting through them. ER is not here this week so no further vacation owing will not be paid out until January.
- El Clawback. We only had about 55 El Clawback claims at the start of last week, now we have well over 100. Due to the volume, El Clawback will begin to be paid in January. The Clawback will be paid to anyone who is retired, still active at work or on layoff but not collecting El. We cannot pay anyone's El Clawback if you are still collecting El, you need to be on full SUB. We will review the El Clawback claims each month and pay out your claim when you are no longer collecting El we will review these once a month and work our way through the list.

At some point the band will get back together, but I won't be along for that ride.

I have asked Mark Gee to take the reins – he is ready. Mark has been coming with me to the important meetings outside the plant, meetings about our future. He has been to the 2 last rounds of bargaining and has a great handle on the language and how the office works. Mark is also currently the recording secretary of both GM and Auto Council and knows the inner workings of both groups.

I will be making a video in January for my last update and a more formal good-bye. But thank you, to everyone, for electing me to represent all of you for the past 19.5 years, it truly was an honour!
